

## AFTER-READING OPTIONS

<b>RESEARCH IT</b>  Do more research on a topic related to the story.	<b>REPORT IT</b>  Write the first paragraph of a news story about the story, telling who, what, where, when and perhaps why or how.
<b>ACT IT OUT</b>  With one or more partners, act out an exciting scene from the story.	<b>CAPTION IT</b>  A caption is a one or two line explanation of a picture or diagram. Choose illustrations from the story and write captions for them.
<b>STORY BOARD IT</b>  Divide a piece of paper into four parts and sketch the beginning, ending and two key events in the middle.	<b>CREATE IT</b>  Create a poster, brochure or handbook to go along with an aspect of the story.
<b>MAP IT</b>  Create a map of the places the characters in your story visited.	<b>TIME IT</b>  Make a timeline to mark key events over a period of time.
<b>TEXT IT</b>  Create a series of text messages or emails from one character to another.	<b>DRAW IT</b>  Make a detailed picture depicting key events from the story. Use arrows to label parts of the picture.
